Re: Stop the Demolitions and Corruption in New Orleans

Dear President Bush,

As international human rights and housing rights activists, members of international solidarity networks, global associations of inhabitants' rights, and tenant rights organizations working around the world, we decry the demolitions of public housing in New Orleans.

Specifically, we are concerned about reports that:

- 1. The demolitions will potentially displace more than 20,000 public housing residents from New Orleans, particularly African Americans and poor people, in the wake of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. These units have been demolished despite being sound and habitable in fact they maintained minimum damage during the storms.
- 2. These decisions have been taken in the context of widespread concern over allegations of corruption by officials overseeing the demolition process, including allegations of self dealing and kickbacks.
- 3. Government officials have not ensured one-for-one replacement housing leaving most former residents with no protection for their right to housing, including prolonged and perhaps permanent displacement, a violation of human rights standards in place for survivors of disasters such as Hurricanes Katrina and Rita.
- 4. The dignity and personal possessions of the former residents have not been respected in this process. Contractors have emptied apartments and discarded and even sold the personal property of residents, including articles of great sentimental and emotional value, without their consent.

Therefore, we urge you to facilitate an immediate halt to any remaining demolitions and ensure a rebuilding process for New Orleans, particularly with respect to public housing, and the greater Gulf Coast region that ensures real and active participation by residents – both those who have returned to the area and those who remain displaced. We additionally request that a commission of inquiry be established immediately to investigate (i) the procedural process that led to the demolitions and (ii) allegations of corruption in connection thereto.

Given the deprivation of housing rights facing public housing tenants who have survived Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, the International Alliance of Inhabitants' Zero Evictions Campaign has instituted the "Stop the Demolitions and Corruption in New Orleans" as its most recent global initiative. The Campaign has received a groundswell of support from concerned organizations, associations and citizens around the world.

The demolitions of public housing in New Orleans come at a time when housing rights protections in New Orleans are severely weakened. For example, rent in the New Orleans area has increased by an average of 43% since Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. This significant increase in rent comes at a time when Katrina and

Rita survivors living in FEMA trailers are being moved out of trailers and into the private rental market due to dangerous levels of formaldehyde. Moreover, New Orleans has seen its homeless population *double* since the hurricanes. These factors coupled with the demolition of over 4,800 units of public housing speak to the serious deprivations of the human right to housing facing New Orleans residents, as well as the right to return regardless of race or economic status. Moreover, these demolitions have been allowed to take place despite international concern as expressed by the UN Special Rapporteur on Adequate Housing Miloon Kothari, UN Independent Expert on Minority Issues Gay McDougall, and the UN Committee on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination in its Concluding Remarks to the U.S. government's report to the body. Specifically, on March 7, 2008, in its Concluding Remarks the Committee charged the U.S. to do more to remedy the effects of racial discrimination in housing and other areas. The Committee noted the "disparate impact that [the] natural disaster[s] continue to have on low income African Americans" and called for local and federal governments to help Katrina's displaced.²

Under human rights standards, governments must provide those who have been internally displaced by events such as natural disasters specific safeguards with respect to housing. Article 21(1) of the UN's Guiding Principles on Internal Displacement, which USAID recognizes when carrying out international development policy, states: "No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of property and possessions." Moreover, Article 28 (1) states: "Competent authorities have the primary duty and responsibility to establish conditions, as well as provide the means, which allow internally displaced persons to return voluntarily, in safety and with dignity, to their homes or places of habitual residence ..."

Additionally, international human rights instruments speak to the human right to housing. Article 25(1) of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which was unanimously adopted by all the member countries of the United Nations, states: "Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well being of himself and of his family, including ... housing ..." Article 11(1) of the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights states: "The States Parties to the present Covenant recognize the right of everyone to an adequate standard of living for himself and his family, including adequate ... housing ... and to the continuous improvement of living conditions." Additionally, the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination, a treaty to which the United States became a party in 1994, states: "States Parties undertake to prohibit and to eliminate racial discrimination in all its forms and to guarantee the right of everyone, ... to equality before the law, notably in the enjoyment of ... the right to housing."

As the United States has been a promoter of democracy, social inclusion and legality to the rest of world, we request and hope that the U.S. government will afford the same respect for human dignity and equality to the survivors of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita that it has encouraged other nations to employ.
